



Political Empowerment of Dalit Women in Maharashtra: A Study of Social, Structural, and Political Realities

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Abstract

The quality of a democratic system depends largely on the extent to which marginalized groups participate in governance. Dalit women constitute one of the most disadvantaged sections of Indian society, facing discrimination based on caste, gender, and economic status simultaneously. Although Maharashtra has a strong legacy of social reform, the effective political representation of Dalit women remains limited. This research paper examines the current status of political empowerment among Dalit women in Maharashtra, the barriers to their participation, the impact of reservation policies, their role in local self-governance institutions, and measures required for meaningful empowerment. The study reveals that while structural barriers continue to restrict their authority, education, self-help groups, and leadership training have initiated gradual transformation.

Maharashtra has historically been a center of social reform movements led by Mahatma Phule, Savitribai Phule, and Dr. B. R. Ambedkar. Despite this progressive heritage, Dalit women's presence in political

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institutions remains constrained by social and structural inequalities. Studying Maharashtra offers valuable insight into both opportunities and persistent challenges in the political empowerment process.

6. Social Background of Dalit Women in Maharashtra

A majority of Dalit women in Maharashtra reside in rural areas. Their literacy levels are lower than the state average. Many work as agricultural laborers, daily wage earners, or in the informal sector. Patriarchal norms often restrict their mobility and public engagement. These socio-economic conditions directly influence their political participation.

7. Panchayati Raj and Political Participation

The 73rd and 74th Constitutional Amendments mandated reservations for women in local governance. Maharashtra provides up to 50% reservation in many local bodies, including reserved seats for Scheduled Caste women. This has significantly increased their numerical presence as Gram Panchayat members, Sarpanches, and Panchayat Samiti representatives.



However, the phenomenon of “proxy leadership” is widespread. Elected women representatives are often controlled by male family members who make decisions on their behalf. This indicates that while formal representation has improved, substantive empowerment remains limited.

8. Representation at State and National Levels

Participation of Dalit women at higher political levels — State Assemblies and Parliament — remains extremely low. Party politics requires financial resources, networks, and organizational support, which are often inaccessible to Dalit women. As a result, their political influence is largely confined to local governance.

9. Analysis of Barriers

A) Social Barriers

Caste discrimination, social exclusion, and lingering untouchability practices hinder leadership acceptance.

B) Economic Barriers

Election campaigns require financial resources, which many Dalit women lack.

C) Educational Barriers

Limited knowledge of governance structures, laws, and administrative processes reduces effectiveness.

D) Cultural Barriers

Traditional gender norms discourage women’s public participation.

Political Barriers

Limited party backing and exclusion from decision-making networks.

10. Role of Self-Help Groups (SHGs)

Women’s self-help groups have played an important role in building confidence and collective identity. Through financial savings, group meetings, and leadership roles, women gain organizational experience and political awareness. SHGs serve as informal platforms for political learning.

11. Government Schemes and Their Impact

Various initiatives aim to enhance women’s participation:

- Reservation policies
- Leadership training programs
- Dalit welfare schemes
- Livelihood and self-employment programs

These programs increase awareness and self-confidence, but uneven implementation limits their effectiveness.
